Hi Patty,

Thanks for your email. My relative's name was August Bickmeyer, although his name is spelled different each time I come across information on him. He went in as a substitute for another man from Allegany in September of 1864, so he didn't serve too long. My suspicion is that the entered the service purely for the money as he received several large bounties and had nine children at home. According to family tradition he took that money and built a brick farm house (which still stands) on his family farm. When the war was over he never joined the local GAR post or the regimental veterans' association, further supporting my suspicion. I have never come across a photograph of him (war-time service, or any other time in his life) and nothing has surfaced from him except in genealogical research.

Below are a few links to resources on the 10th NY Cavalry--I assume you might have already come across them though. The New York State Military Museum in Saratoga Springs, NY has a wealth of information on their website about all New York State regiments that were in the Civil War.

I collect original war-date items and veterans' memorabilia and have a number of items from the 10th NY Cavalry, and a few from the 64th NY Infantry. I just recently purchased a group of documents all belonging to Abram Tucker of Company E, 10th NY Cavalry who enlisted in Brant. Here is a bit about Tucker

from the 10th NY Cavalry roster:

Tucker, Abram. Age, 19 years. Enlisted, October 5, 1861, at Brant; mustered in as corporal, Co. E, October 5, 1861, to serve three years; re-enlisted, as private, December 18, 1863; transferred, January 15, 1864, to Co. F 24th NY Cavalry and appointed first lieutenant.

I'd be happy to provide you with images of these documents as soon as I find time to scan them.

I also just looked through my digital files on the 10th NY Cavalry, but not too much turned up in regards to Brant. I did find one letter written by Gilbert Southwick of Company B, 10th NY Cavalry in which he mentions a man from Brant who was sick. I have attached the letter in a Word document to this email.

I own a number of original images of members of the 10th NY Cavalry that were not from Brant, but from Erie County if they would be of interest to you. The 10th NY Cavalry began recruiting in late 1861 principally in Buffalo.

Another good resource for information on the 10th NY Cavalry is their regimental history. You may have come across a copy of it, but if not, it has been fully digitized online here: https://archive.org/details/05535657.3380.emory.edu

I have also compiled a binder of documents, images, and letters about the 10th NY Cavalry over the years; I'll look through it to see if I can find anything pertaining to Brant.

Most of my research on the 64th NY has been on men that served from my hometown (Allegany, NY) that served with the regiment, so I don't think I have anything on Brant, but I'll check.

The 64th did not publish a regimental history, but Steve Rogers from Ithaca, NY (where one company of the 64th was recruited) has been working on one for years. He is really "the" authority on the regiment. You might also contact Phil Palen of Gowanda, NY. He is the historian of the town and has done a considerable amount of research on the unit as well. The first Colonel of the regiment, Thomas J. Parker, was from Gowanda.

That's a start I guess. I feel like I am just rambling at this point. You might have come across most of this information already, but if not, I hope it might be helpful to you.

Do you have any material (letters, photos, diaries etc.) from either of these regiments?

I'd love to continue this conversation. I'll keep looking, and I'll keep racking my brain for further info.

I contacted someone who designs reproduction quilt fabric and was told that the fabric in the quilt dates from around 1890.

I leave all options open until I go up and down each line for each signer, right now it is leading toward Belle Shearer, who does not appear on the quilt. Brides wouldn't I imagine. Marriage 1892. Are there any records from that Methodist Church for marriages that year? I have enjoyed the history lesson on Erie County and the migration of these people from Europe to Vermont and then to the different counties surrounding Brant.

There is at least one line of blood that leads to the Revolutionary War, the Shearers blood line goes to Barstable, Ma. and the War. There was also a large migration of Howards coming from Vermont. Many families came together and settled the area.

I would love more pictures, have somehow lost or misplaced Clara Calkins photo, would you send again if perhaps you find it again. Well, off to antiquing, something else I love to do. Oh, I have sent your contact info to Mr. Spangler and perhaps he will contact you. Remember Dora Knapp Hoffman is not out of the running and if it is her quilt, wow we go back Mrs. Sally Newell Jameson who is supposed to have a half sister who were the Clarks, another very old family in Brant.



The Methodists of the vicinity formed a class about 1840 or 1842, under the Rev. Mr. Fenton, then a local preacher on the Collins and Brant circuit. Among the early members were Abram Vincent, who was the first class-leader; Mr. and Mrs. Josiah Smith, Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Wood, and Ephraim Willis, a local preacher. As before stated, the Methodists aided in finishing the building belonging to the Baptists and occupied it jointly with them for many years, but having grown stronger they at length erected the handsome edifice now in use. There are now forty-seven members, with the following officers:—S. M. Butts, Ralph Evans, O. Elsworth, A. B. Wood and H. P. Christy, trustees; A.

B. Wood and O. Elsworth, class leaders; Anthony Taylor, clerk; Richard Christy, sexton. This church is in pastoral connection with the one at Evans.

believe it was near A.B. Wood's property. Here is my request, as far as I can tell from the 1820 and 1830 census (since there were no names other than the primary - head of household) A. B.'s father is John Wood. John had a many children and moved them (some or all) to the Brant/Hamburg area. I know one of A.B.'s brothers was Sylvester Wood. The name Sylvester is from John's wife Huldah Pierce, her father was Sylvester Pierce from VT, I digress (sorry). So I am wondering if the Wood Bros. was something that A. B. and some of his sibling were involved with? Not sure if you can discover anything along those lines. Sylvester had four children all born in Brant, (Dennis, Sarah, Lucelia, and Marvin). Sylvester moved on with his brood to Michigan before the war. Anyway, too much info I am sure, but one of my hopes is that I can locate other siblings of A. B., Sylvester was born in 1800 and A. B. in 1814, that leaves a lot of room for other children which according to the census of that time existed, alas I just do not have any names.



The Village of Farnham was incorporated on June 15th, 1892. In 2017, Farnham will be celebrating 125 years! A committee has been formed and celebration plans are underway. If you are interested in being a part of this committee, please see Jackie Hoisington, Village of Farnham Clerk, for more information. Others who are part of this Anniversary Committee are: Jere Hoisington, Mayor; Yvonne Heller, Elizabeth Huffnagle, Maggie Borowoski, Shelia Rauker, with support from Bev Wasmund, Jo Battaglia, Patty Friend and the Brant-Farnham Historical Society.

The first recorded merchant in Farnham was Leroy Farnham, after whom Farnham was named. George Walker owned the second store. Other merchants followed: Charles F. Goodman, W.W. Hammond and Henry Slender. Farnham Station Business Directory circa 1864 listed W.W. Hammond, dealer in general merchandise and attorney at law; W.W. and G. Hammond, proprietors of a steam sawmill; W.W. Stewart and Phillip Cleese, blacksmith; Henry Lewis, manufacturer and dealer in boots and shoes; C. Jacob Cook: P. Brant, Pastor of Lutheran Church and Hiram



Crawford, F. Phillip, L.S. Shaw, L. Turk, John Steward, F. Brinkman, H. John Gropdal and Chris Sewert, residents.

In 1892 Farnham was a thriving community. It was an important railroad station mainly supported by the Erie Preserving Company, which was one of the largest canneries in New York State. A large business district developed, followed by a growth in population which required housing and services. To fill this need for incorporation, a petition was made and sent to the State. It was approved and the Village of Farnham was incorporated on June 15th, 1892.




